All the OSALL Committee reports from the recent AGM are included in this "bumper edition."

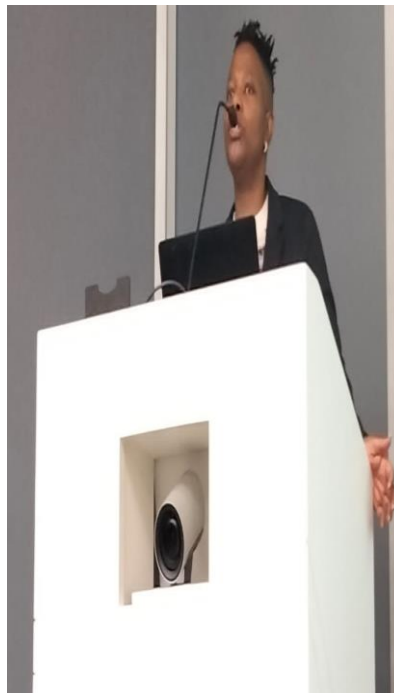

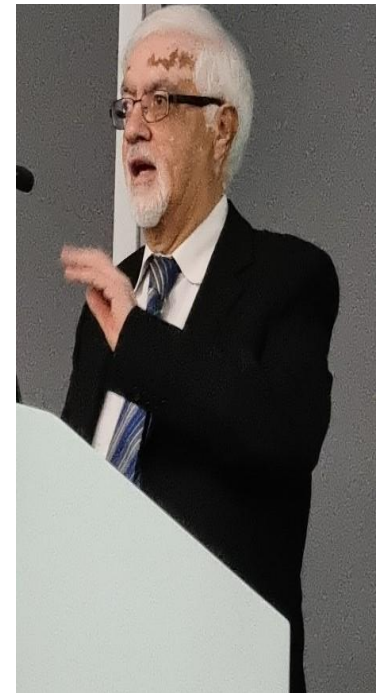

### PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT AND NETWORKING IN LAW LIBRARIANSHIP

#### Professional Development and Networking in Law Librarianship

##### Introduction

Professional development and networking are key skills that are critical for professional growth in our careers. While they are not taught in schools, they are self-directed learning opportunities that should be taken at every point in one's career. These two concepts are synonymous to each other. It is through professional development activities that you build your networks. Having a strong professional network is not to be taken for granted because it helps to build your turf in your career no matter what stage you're at. In professions such as the legal and medical fields, it is mandatory to complete some continuing professional development through educational activities in order to continue practicing.

Traditionally, activities for professional development include in-person annual conferences, occasional webinars, and other social events. These annual gatherings provide opportunities to learn from one another and are often the highlight of many people's careers. Whether you're working in an academic, law firm, government, or special library, it is important to retrain, retool and update your skills to enhance your performance.

As a newly trained librarian, one of my professional development journeys started with the Bart Nwafor Fellowship awarded by the African Section of the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions in 1999. I spent four weeks at the University of Port Elizabeth (now Nelson Mandela University) Library learning and understanding the processes from collection development, cataloguing and classification, administration, and management. What did I gain from this experience? It broadened my knowledge about library and information science practices in that part of the world. I learnt about the South African legal system, as well as others in the region.

Most recently, when I assumed the new leadership position in my institution, I registered for and attended a course at an Ivy League institution in the United States. The benefits of enrolling in the Harvard University Leadership Institute for Academic Librarians Program include learning and gaining some insight about leadership and organizational management skills.

#### Professional Development Goals in Law Library Associations

Many of us are affiliated with one professional association or the other through personal or institutional memberships. While I was preparing for this article, I reviewed the websites of professional associations related to law libraries for their mission statements, strategic goals, and constitutions. I found the following statements that relate to professional development and networking. All of the associations highlight the importance of professional development to their members. The phrase features prominently on these websites and I have listed those phrases below.

These statements demonstrate the importance of professional development and networking to professional growth. These associations through their member volunteers and management companies spend a considerable amount of time and effort planning and putting together all these programs.

Goal 2 of the AALL of the strategic plan of the AALL focuses on Professional Growth.

#### Future of Professional Development

The COVID-19 pandemic impacted all aspects of our lives but taught us that professional development among other activities can continue without in-person activities. From March 2020, most professional development activities were switched to virtual delivery. This

During the pandemic, I was able to participate in several online webinars, training and discussions facilitated by different groups for a number of free online professional development programs that covered various topics in law and librarianship. These programs were not only deeply engaging, but they gave me an opportunity to meet new professionals and experts. For example, there’s always a free webinar at the Library of Congress focusing on a foreign jurisdiction.

As the world is gradually reopening to the new normal, make it a professional obligation to yourself to participate in a program that will build your knowledge in your current job. Changes are imminent which will involve introducing hybrid options for annual conferences to boost participation and attendance.

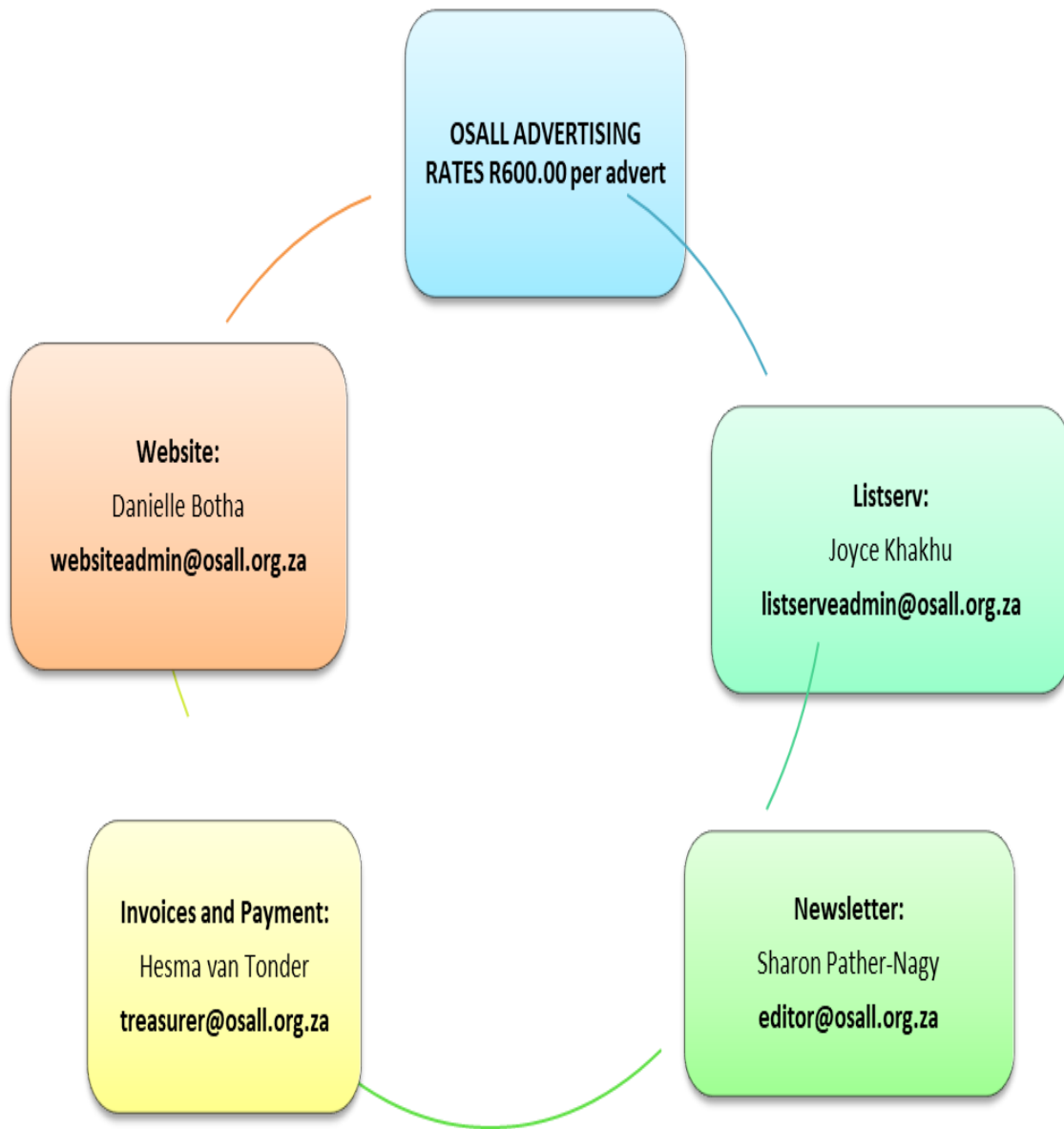
